

The cow above referred to and in respect of which this claim is made, was in the yard unattended from Easter Tuesday to the following Saturday, and Deponent had no access to the yard. He applied several times to the military for liberty to go to fetch the cow, but the Authorities would not allow him outside his house, and when on Saturday he was allowed to the yard, he found the cow in a dying condition for want of food and drink, had her knackered and received £5 for the carcass).
