I wish to submit for the
consideration of your Committee
the following claim for Compens-
ation resulting from the recent
disturbances in the city.

The facts are :-

I was on duty (as a tel-
-egraph Clerk) in the General
Post office on Easter Monday.

when the Building was captured
by the rebels. On the staff
being ordered out, I made an
attempt to get to the Cloakroom
where my overcoat and hat were
but was held up by a rebel
and ordered out of the Building
at the point of the bayonet
I had therefore to leave be-
hind, my overcoat & hat
(value £4) and get home
without either.

I submit that this

loss was not the result of
any carelessness on my part,
and was due entirely to the
fact of my being on duty.
and that consequently I am
clearly entitled to Com-
-pensation
