During the recent rebellion my offices were broken into by the military for the purpose of searching for rebels, ammunition, etc., and goods to the value of £11-1;11 abstracted by the search parties. The goods consisted of

Perfumery, Fancy Toilet Soaps, etc to the value of Canned Fruits, Sugar, etc

The caretaker living on the premises informs me that none of the looters attacked this house, nor were there any of the rebels at any time in the building, altho the latter were on the roof for a short period.

My offices were visited during Easter week on two or three occasions by military search parties. One of my office doors was forced in by the military on the first visit, and the caretaker opened the other door for them with a key found in my office, and on the occasion of each subsequent visit she opened the doors for the military party.

I make this claim for compensation based on the catalogue prices for 1915, and not at the cost price of the present day.

None of the goods taken by the military were covered by insurance.
