Dear Sir,

Referring to the arrangement entered into with your good Self regarding the temporary occupation of the Shannon Rowing Club premises, I am instructed by my Committee to request that you will be good enough to let them know how matters stand with reference to compensation etc. and with this object in view I append a few points upon which my Committee would wish to be enlightened.

Needless to say the Committee of this Club have quite willingly granted the Military Authorities all the facilities at their disposal, and have no intention or desire of making anything in the nature of unreasonable claims, their object being merely to obtain compensation for actual losses and to spread the burden over the entire community instead of allowing same fall with undue severity upon the Members of the Club.

We feel confident that the Authorities will recognise our claim for reasonable allowances, and beg to take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation of the courtesy which we have received at your hands in connection with the occupation of the premises.

Fire Insurance Premium. In this connection it has been pointed out that the Insurance Company would probably repudiate responsibility in the case of fire, hence the Committee would be glad of an assurance that in such a contingency the Government would undertake responsibility.

Regarding the probable period of occupation, the question arises in this connection as to whether the Committee will be obliged to engage temporary premises for the use of the Members. Should the Military occupation be prolonged the Committee feel that the danger arises of a loss of revenue through Members objecting to pay full subscriptions unless usual Club facilities are provided, and therefore it may become necessary to secure temporary premises. The Committee however will refrain from taking any steps in this direction for the present, being hopeful that possession of the Club ~~and~~ house may soon be restored. If however it should be necessary to retain the premises for Military purposes for some considerable time, the Committee presume that a fair sum will be allotted to the Club as a set off against the curtailment of the Members privileges, as well as the out of pocket expenses above mentioned.

Dear Sir,

I am in receipt of your letter of the 2nd inst. regarding the occupation of the premises of the Shannon Rowing Club Limerick by the Troops under my Command, and am communicating for a distinct undertaking on the report, with Head Quarters.

I much regret the very great inconvenience caused by such occupation, which I trust will only be temporary, to your members and yourself, as well as to your employees, and I am sure the Military authorities will deal with your claim in the most liberal manner, as soon as the facts of the case are known to them.

May I now take this opportunity of thanking your President, Members, and all concerned, for the great courtesy and promptness with which they not only met my wishes, but also for the facilities and willingness, one and all displayed in assisting me to perform what was a very unpleasant task, but one which was absolutely necessary under the circumstances.

I shall endeavour to get you definite assurances on the subject of your letter as soon as possible.
