We have again gone into this claim, but have been unable to ascertain that any general looting took place, and are of opinion that Claimant suffered no loss to Stock beyond the damage to Goods by the Soldiers and what they took away.

We have seen a Balance Sheet of the Trading for the year ending 1st February last. To give the same ratio of Profit as in the preceding year, the Balance Sheet would require to show Stock to the value of £220 : 0 : 0 more.

It is impossible to arrive at the exact loss, but we consider our original estimate of £200 near the mark. In any case, we are satisfied the loss could not exceed another £50 : 0 : 0.

The Prices charged in claim for Goods are grossly exaggerated; being generally 25-% over ordinary Selling Prices. One item of claim is for two Motor Coats @ 90/- each. There were no Coats approaching this price in the Stock-taking Sheets 31st January 1916, and Claimant could only prove the purchase of two Motor Coats between the 1st February 1916 and the date of the Rebellion. These cost 36/- & 38/- respectively.



Several panes of Glass in the Upper Windows were broken during the Rebellion, but the Plate Glass Insurance does not include these Panes.

The Building Policy is in name of Lessor (John Purcell deceased) but Claimants pay the Premium and have repaired some of the damage.

ROOFS AND SLATING.

I propose and agree to strip off all loose broken and damaged slates on roofs, fit on New Slating, Laths required properly nailed to Rafters. To recover the portions stripped with new 24 x 14 Bangot Slates, nailed to Laths and secured with Lead Clips. Strip off broken Fillets and renew with new Cement, ganged Fillets on Roof and Chimney, point the position of Chimney where joints raked out. Take down the frame casement of Roof Light, repair and fit same, refit glass and paint the woodwork.

GUTTERS.

To clear out centre and Fillet gutters and repair same fit on cement ganged Fillets to flashings of walls and barges and leave roof water-tight.

PLASTERING CEILINGS.

To take down damaged Ceilings of Top Rooms, strip off Slating, Laths, defective, clear off old plaster, Fit Brace Ties from Furloins to Rafters to secure same. Relath Ceilings stripped with sawn plastering Laths with suitable key to carry plaster, prepare joints and surface, plaster ceilings in two coats, prepared plaster gauged in Cow Hair and Plaster Paris, and finish same in Lime Putty and Plaster Paris finished white on surface.

WALLS+

To hack off damaged plaster on walls in two top rooms and Landing. Replaster same gauged with Plaster Paris and finished White.

CARPENTERING.

To take out casement windows of first and second warerooms, hack out the broken glass, repair sashes and frames damaged with new timber, refit sashes, fit slips, casings and fastners required, prepare, Prime and Paint sashes, frames and casings, in 2 coats oil, paint when glazed in plate glass.
