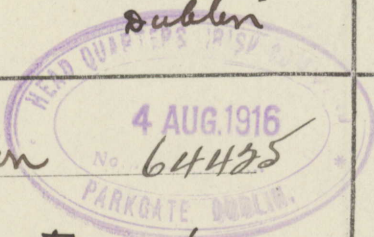

With reference to preceding minutes, I beg to report as follows. There was no Detachment of this Battalion at Kingstown during the Sinn Fein rising except some who were attached to the Railway Transport Officer's Staff there. These men are still doing duty with that Staff. There may also have been a few men of the Battalion held up there on their return journey from leave in England; it would however be now impossible to trace these men.

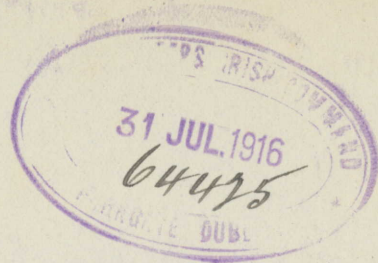

Have the honour to make the following report on Minute 1. attached.-

The detachment under my command left Kingstons on 2nd May & the losses in question may therefore have occurred after that date; Minute No 1 stating, that troops were in occupation up to 21st May. In fact a composite body consisting of men stranded in Kingstons was in occupation of the station when the detachment under my command left.

To the best of my belief the refreshment room itself was closed at night & was not at any time occupied by troops, my detachment being quartered in the waiting-rooms on the platform & in an empty room in the basement of the station-master's house.

At the time of leaving Kingstons no question of compensation or damage was raised by Mrs Pice & the facts mentioned in her letter were never brought to my notice, though I made repeated visits during the day to the station while my detachment was stationed at Kingstons.

Sir,

I beg^{leave} to draw your attention to the following while the Military occupied portion of my premises during the recent rebellion, some of my household goods were taken away by the troops and up to this, they have not been returned. The troops were in occupation from the 26th of April to the 21st May, no doubt the R.T.O. at Kingstown can verify. The articles missing are 7 red plush curtains belonging to Tea Room about 8 feet by 5. I believe they were used as blankets by the troops and taken away by them, also two folding stretcher beds and bedding, about two dozen china cups and saucers, between two and three dozen^{tea} knives, 7 large party tea pots and a number of dinner plates and sundry other articles including two large pots. I may mention that some of the articles were lent by me to the troops during the time they occupied my premises. Failing a return of above articles, I beg to make claim for their value namely ten pounds.
