I am unable to obtain any definite information regarding this claim. The O.C. No.1 Section Southern Cordon knows nothing of the matter. A Mr. Byrne, 19 Leinster Market, states that he saw a Corpl. of the 8th. Hussars break in and distribute the goods to the people in the neighbourhood, but his unsupported evidence I do not consider convincing.

I am of opinion that the claim should be declined by the Military Authorities and that ~~the~~ Mr. Dunne should put forward a claim to the proper authorities as a case of looting.

Dear Sir

In reply to yours of the 24<sup>th</sup> inst  
re claim of ours for poultry taken by  
Military Authorities. The witness who  
states that it was a corporal of 8<sup>th</sup>  
Hussars is Mr Byrne, 19 Lincolns Market.  
I questioned the other residents of the  
said Market but none of them knew  
what regiment ~~the~~ that entered our  
Premises. They all admit that they  
were given something in the way of  
poultry along with other staff that

was taken out of Messrs O & R. Dwyer  
Hawkins Street. I do not live on  
the premises and the whole house is  
unoccupied. I was not able to  
get into business from the Wednesday  
until the following ~~Monday~~ <sup>Monday</sup> ~~Monday~~ <sup>Monday</sup>.  
We take stock every night and the  
goods claimed were missing when  
we took stock on the return to  
business after the trouble. They were  
taken out of the refrigerator room  
which is entered by a trap-door in the  
rear of shop. I am not in a  
position to say if the military used  
any of the goods for their own use, but  
from the inquiries in the immediate neighbor-  
hood of the amount of goods seen by the  
starving people it is very far from the  
amount missing. Or perhaps it was brought  
to the streets at the bottom of market &  
distributed there. The military, I am informed,  
were continuously on duty outside our door.  
These are the only facts I am getting
