I have now investigated this claim and personally interviewed the Applicant. I have ascertained that the stuff was requisitioned by the Military for barricading purposes on the date in question. I was quite at a loss to understand what useful purpose Quilts and Sheets would serve, but on making most careful inquiries I have ascertained that the bedding was seen lying about the streets by respectable neighbours. The Claimant herself is respectable, but has inflated her estimate of values.

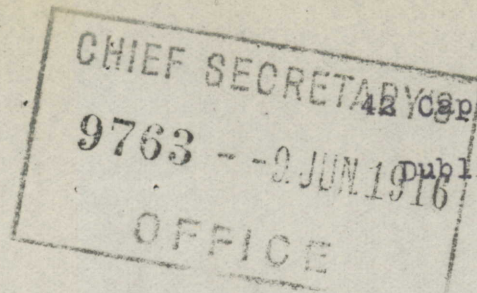

On the 13th May last I wrote to the Military Authorities claiming compensation for beds, bedding and chairs taken by them to erect a barricade and enclosing a detailed account of the articles taken. On the 29th May I received a reply (copy enclosed) saying they did not admit any liability but had handed my letter and account to you.

As my claim is for articles commandeered by the Military and not for damage done by them by reason of the disturbances, I think I should be repaid at least the bare value of the articles taken, which is all I have claimed.

I would feel obliged if you could give the matter early attention as I have been greatly knocked about by the loss of those articles.

I May 13th 1916

On the 27th April 1916 an Officer (Lieut. Jameson) and men of the Leinster Regiment entered the house 42 Capel St & took up a position there; at about 7.30 P.M. they entered my Rooms and took therefrom beds, bedding and chairs (for the purpose of making a Barricade across Mary St.) which they did not return.

I respectfully beg to enclose an account of the loss I have sustained thereby, and feel assured that His Majesty's Government will make some good to me at earliest convenience.
