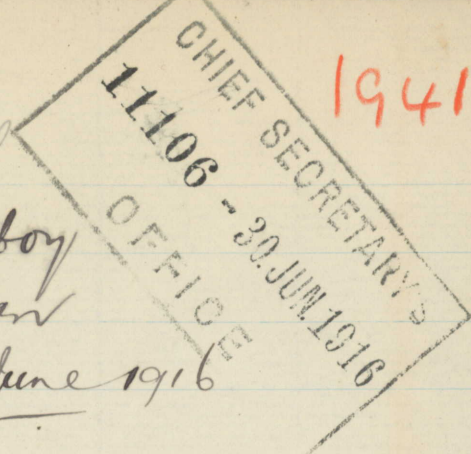

GENERAL POST OFFICE, DUBLIN.

Sir,

With reference to your letters of the 11th and 18th instant, I have to inform you that the loss of the Registered packet to which you refer occurred in the course of the recent disturbances in this country.

As will be seen on reference to page 30 of the Post Office Guide the Postmaster General will if he thinks fit refuse to give compensation for loss or damage on any ground on which a common carrier might in like case claim exemption from legal liability and he cannot, therefore, regard himself as under any obligation to pay compensation in respect of the loss or damage of postal packets attributable to the recent disturbances. Your claim, however, has been noted and in the event of its being decided on further consideration that there are circumstances which would justify the Postmaster General in accepting liability you will be informed in due course.

I have to add that it may be some time before a decision
