

DESCRIPTIVE PARTICULARS

AS REGARDS CERTAIN ITEMS IN CLAIM OF MR. NORMAN DEWAR.

No. 1. SIGN

An Electrically lit sign with iron bracket for support the lettering being on opal glass two sides with lights inside.

- No. 2. BENT GLASS CASE fitting round one side of Hall Door, height about 5 foot 3 inches, 2 pieces of bent glass, the upper one used for show purposes, the lower one contained the name in large gold letters on black, the woodwork was of good quality and the design showed two carved circular pillars running up to the top of sase the top of pillars being warved in ivy leaves.
- No. 3. The Usual <u>FLAT CASES</u> seen inside Photographers halls for show purposes, four compartments measuring each about 5 foot by 4, each lined with moveable woodwork back for pinning on Photos.
- No. 4. SUITE OF FURNITURE used in the Reception Room, comprising 4 chairs, Settee, 2 arm chairs and sofa, recently upholstered, on the Chippendale pattern.
- No. 5. OFFICE DESK Mahogany desk with opening in centre,
 drawers in middle and down side, the usual desk seen in
 Solicitors offices.
- No. 6. FRAMED SPECIMENS. Specimens done from time to time including enlargements, colour work, for the purpose of

showing to customers and also decoration, the enlargments contain artist work.

No. 7. DRY MOUNTER The usual mounter for mounting Photos, picked up second hand, present price about £10.

- No. 8. MOUNTS Mounts have been very much increased since the
 War started and £25 worth would be a very small stock to
 keep business going, in all there would be about 10 sizes.
- No. 9 MATERIAL etc. The usual amount on hands for carrying on the work.
- No. 10 102 YEARS NEGATIVES. Negatives stored and registered are always a valuable asset to the Photographer, we constantly get repeat orders which amounts to a good deal in the year. A Customer might die and immediately it becomes valuable for extra copies, enlargements and sometimes for publication.
- No. 11. ENLARGING CAMERA Of the Cantilever pattern, Mahogany with bellows. 8 inch condenser. Very good Portrait lens Acetylene Generator and jet.
- No. 12. 12X10 CAMERA Camera used for Outdoor Work. Mahogany,
 12 X 10 American lens, Cooke 12 X 10 Wide angle lens,
 focussing lens, 3 double dark slides, Mahogany, stout
 stand, the whole fitting in to a strong leather case made
 to my own design.
- No. 13. T PLATE CAMERA Camera used for Outdoor work, Mahogany
 1/1 Plate Anastigmat lens. 1/1 Plate wide angle lens, 6

double mahogany dark slides and stand, the whole fitting into a strong leather case made to my own design.

- No. 14. PRESS CAMERA Bought recently at an Auction. A perfectly new and up to date Camera with all the latest movements, would cost at least £20 to replace.
- No.15 STUDIO CAMERA A combination of the Camera belonging to M.:

 Glover late of Stephens Green and Robinsons late of Grafton St.

 Mahogany Camera and Studio Stand, Ross Portrait lens and 1 Plate
 group and portrait lens. This instrument was the basis of my
 business; which did all my portrait work; was an excellent piece
 of apparatus. A camera of this sort improves with age and although
 it would cost about £40 to replace same, a new Camera would not
 have the same virtue.
- No.16. STUDIO SUITE. The usual Suite found in Photo. Studios similar to Drawing room Suite.
- No.17. STUDIO ACCESSORIES This comprises articles used in posing sitters, such as Backgrounds, screens, Curtains on glass roof for lighting, Balcony and Pedestal, French Settee, ordinary Settee, fancy chairs, tables, head rests, eye rests, carpet etc.
- No.18, ELECTRIC PLANT Arc lamp for the purpose of Photographing by night light, cable from street brought a long way, box fitted in roof tor allow for elevation of Lamp, lined outside with lead and fitting.
- No.19. ELECTRIC LIGHTING lighting of premises, including Hall, Landing Reception room, Stair to Studio, Workroom and Studio.

EXTRACT FROM ORDER OF 21st SEPT., '04 (12,918-04).

Documents shall only be removed from files when actually required for use in detached form.

- The usual notation as to the particular papers taken, and the purpose for which detached, with the initials of the Officer responsible for the removal, and the date, shall be made on the packets in every case.
- The documents shall be restored as promptly as possible, and the dates of return noted.
- Only such documents shall be placed in packets as could not otherwise be conveniently examined, or as might be liable to mutilation if pinned to the files in the ordinary way.
