shutters of the shop 48 Capel Street which was then in the possession of Joseph Madden as tenant. The shutters were taken down by the soldiers during the Rebellion and were used by them to make barricades in Capel Street, they were never returned or found.

Since the date of sending in the claim in Mr. Madden's name. Mr. Madden has died and his tenancy ceased and the shop is now empty.

We are acting for Miss Bessie Read daughter of John Read of Claremount Carrickmines Co. Dublin who is the Owner of the house, and who now claims compensation for the loss of the shutters.

We enclose a copy of an estimate of Mr. James Barrett of 37 & 38 Molesworth Street, for making new shutters amounting to £15. 10. 0 which sum is claimed on behalf of Miss Bessie Read the Owner of the house.

Mr. Joseph Madden, Bootmaker 48 Capel Street who lives at 15 Homefarm Road, Drumcondra, visited the shop 48 Capel Street every day until Thursday Morning, 27th April. On Friday Morning he was stopped at Drumcondra by the Military also on Saturday Morning. On Sunday Morning after 12 O'Clock he was not allowed to pass Drumcondra. On Monday was stopped and was referred to Ballybough Bridge by the Sentry to see the Officer in Command to get a pass, got the pass and came to 48 Capel Street and found that the shutters were gone from the front of the shop. He was informed by several of his neighbours, Mrs Doyle of 47 Capel Street, Mrs Lenan of 49 Capel Street and Mrs. Fagan, 46 Capel Street and Mrs. Campion 120 Capel Street, the house facing 48 Capel Street, that they saw the military removing the shutters which they carried away for the purpose of making a barricade and he has not been able to trace—them since.
