Dear Madam,

I understand that you were in charge of the Office of the "D. B. C", Sackville Street, on the eventful Easter Monday. - A client of mine, a Mr Robert Newport, called at the Establishment that day about 11 o'clock with another gentleman and a lady, and left in the Office a Suit Case, intending to return and call for it later. In the meantime, however, the Rebellion broke out, and he was not able to get back, and of course, as you know, the premises were ultimately burned.

He has made a claim in respect of the Suit Case, and has verified the above facts by his Affidavit, but the Property Losses Commissioners asked to have his evidence corroborated by some independent witness—and I write to know if you can possibly assist me. I amafraid it is rather in the nature of "looking for a needle in a bundle of hay" to ask you if you can remember such details on such an eventful day, but possibly you may be able to do so, and if so, I shall be much obliged if you will let me hear from you.

- That on Easter Monday, the 24th April 1916, I spent the day in Dublin with Robert Newport of the Provincial Bank Enniscorthy. That about 11 o'clock in the morning, in my presence, at the Restaurant known as D.B.C. Sackville Street, he handed into the office a suit case, with the professed intention of calling for it later in the day.
- That owing to the riot having broken out he was unable to return to the restaurant to get up the suit case and to the best of my knowledge and belief he never did recover the same.

I make this declaration pursuant to the Statutory Declarations Act 1835 and for the satisfaction of the Property Losses Committee.

THE MEMORIAL of ROBERT NEWPORT of the Provincial Bank, Enniscorthy, SHOWETH:

That being in Dublin during the Easter Holidays he called at the premises of the Dublin Bread Company known as the D.B.C. Sackville Street, for luncheon, and temporarily left there his suit case. Subsequently he sought to get it back, but the disturbance had broken out and owing to the condition of the street he was unable to get back to the premises, and, as is generally known, they were subsequently destroyed. He estimates the value of the suit case and contents at £5. 5. 0.
