I understand that you were in charge of the Office of the "D. B. C", Sackville Street, on the eventful Easter Monday. - A client of mine, a Mr Robert Newport, called at the Establishment that day about 11 o'clock with another gentleman and a lady, and left in the Office a Suit Case, intending to return and call for it later. In the meantime, however, the Rebellion broke out, and he was not able to get back, and of course, as you know, the premises were ultimately burned.

He has made a claim in respect of the Suit Case, and has verified the above facts by his Affidavit, but the Property Losses Commissioners asked to have his evidence corroborated by some independent witness, - and I write to know if you can possibly assist me. I am afraid it is rather in the nature of "looking for a needle in a bundle of hay" to ask you if you can remember such details on such an eventful day, but possibly you may be able to do so, and if so, I shall be much obliged if you will let me hear from you.

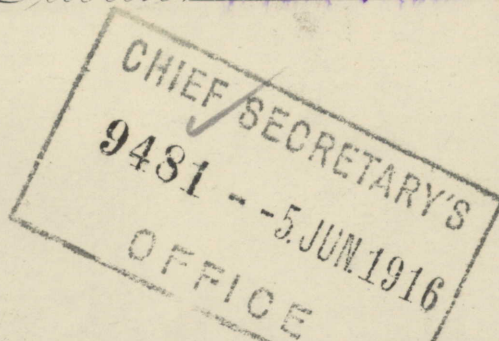

THE MEMORIAL of ROBERT NEWPORT  
of the Provincial Bank, Enniscorthy,  
SHOWETH:

That being in Dublin during the Easter Holidays he called at the premises of the Dublin Bread Company known as the D.B.C. Sackville Street, for luncheon, and temporarily left there his suit case. Subsequently he thought to get it back, but the disturbance had broken out and owing to the condition of the street he was unable to get back to the premises, and, as is generally known, they were subsequently destroyed. He estimates the value of the suit case and contents at £5. 5. 0.
