My claim for thirty pounds for
approximate loss I sustained during
the rebellion I sent to Mr Samuels Home,
Deas Whitestall. He replied he forwarded
to the Property Losses Committee Dublin.

The loss consisted of Damage and
padding skin Cosings. I lost my entire
left shoe and for a month after
Christmas week I had not the wearing of
a plim.

From Christmas Saturday until the
following Tuesday week I could not get
near my place and my little stock was
rotten.

I very respectfully say my case
was one of great hardship and I'd
be deeply grateful if your Committee would
give it early consideration.

I beg respectfully to bring under your kind consideration the undermentioned loss I sustained during the late rebellion in Dublin. From Easter Saturday until the following Tuesday week I could not get to my place of business, and as my stock was of a perishable nature it got entirely destroyed. May I submit as my goods were highly perishable, ~~and should not~~ my small claim should not be ruled out under the words "Consequential damages".

I was for 3 weeks idle and, ^{as} I am a very struggling man, I appeal with confidence to your sense of justice to do something for me.
