

ENGINEMAN'S GALLANTRY.

Shot While Rescuing a Wounded Soldier.

Among the many stirring incidents of the first day of the trouble, Mr. Henry Conroy, an engineman employed at the Bridewell Police Courts, figured heroically in a dangerous episode in Chancery place. He was crossing the street from the courtyard when he saw a troop of Lancers entering Chancery place from the quays. The first soldier had not proceeded far when he was shot by the insurgents, who were at the gate of the Four Courts. The Lancer fell from his horse, and Mr. Conroy at once rushed over to his assistance and, while endeavouring with one hand to hold the horse, which was prancing about, succeeded in carrying the soldier to the footpath. He would have rendered further assistance, but another shot was fired, and he received a bullet himself over the hip, and had to make his way as best he could to the following, where he was attended to by Dr. Oulton.
