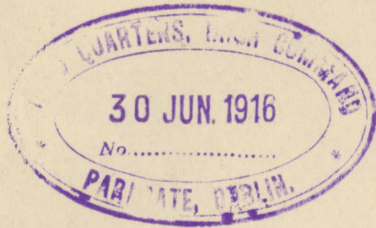

Remember Mr P. Lyghe coming to me for a pass to bring in milk from his dairy, to sell along the Shiel, and his pass was renewed As far as I am aware no milk was commendered by any portion of the Ulster Composit. Bⁿ as on that date they were not in that locality and further we returned all that Bⁿ direct from our Regiment at supplies at Amma's Street Rly Station and we had only a few details in Amma's Street Rly Station on that date.

Troops in that locality on that date to the best of my knowledge were Reserve Cavalry 5th Lancers and 4th Bn R. I. Fusiliers.

With reference to your R B No 2663, dated 23rd June, 1916, the attached report of Major C de M Leathes, 5th Battalion Royal Irish Rifles, Second in Command of the Ulster Composite Battalion, is forwarded for the information of Headquarters, Irish Command.

I would point out, as stated in my Minute No 559, dated II-6-16, and also in Major Leathes' report, the Ulster Composite Battn were not in the locality on the date mentioned. Major Leathes was left by me in command at Amien's Street station where there was a detachment of the 4th Battalion Royal Irish Fusiliers guarding the station and its ⁿ approaches. This detachment came under my command but did not form portion of the Composite Battalion, as they were detailed for duty at Amien's Street station, and in my absence were under the command of Major Leathes.

On the orders of Headquarters, Irish Command, there were a number of police and twelve or fifteen detectives, attached to Major Leathes for the purpose of identifying any civilians brought to the station, and also of civilians leaving by train. Major Leathes also was empowered to grant passes, and in the ordinary way granted one to Mr P Tyghe. He, as he states, has no knowledge of any milk being commandeered.

To the best of my knowledge and belief the troops occupying the locality in question on the date mentioned were under the command of Colonel Meldon, 4th Battalion Dublin Fusiliers, and comprised the 4th Battalion Dublin Fusiliers and a detachment from the Reserve Cavalry Regiment.

Reference the attached, it cannot refer to any of the detachment forming the Battalion under my Command, as they were not in the occupation of the street in question after the 26th of April. From that date on they occupied from the Butt Bridge along Beresford Place and Lower Gardiner Street to Summer Hill, and from that cleared in towards Sackville Street. Further there was no Officer of the name of Mayor, or anything like it, belonging to any of the detachments forming the Battalion, nor did I hear of any such occurrence as the commandeering of milk.

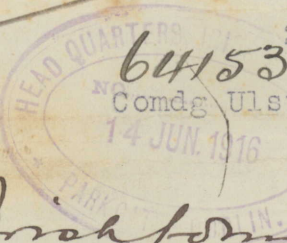
From my recollection, the matter possibly concerns either the 4th Dublin Fusiliers, or the Reserve Cavalry, or the detachment of the 4th Irish Fusiliers, who were under my Command at Amiens Street Station, but as far as I am aware I should have had knowledge of the occurrence if the 4th Irish Fusiliers had anything to do with it.
