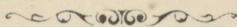



Dear Sir

A son of mine was attending a wireless school in Obonnell st up to Easter. The school was completely destroyed during the rebellion. A gentleman, named Turner, now an officer in a Flying Corps, was proprietor of the school. My boy had got only about half-way through his course. The fee and his support cost me £25, which has been lost, as I cannot afford to send him to another school, and he must turn to something else. Turner, of course, will be making a claim, and, if the Government eventually consider consequential losses, this class of loss might come within the limits of that consideration. I would be very thankful if you would kindly afford me any information that would assist me in putting forward my claim in the event of the Govt. taking a generous view of losses beyond the actual damage to property.

<p>This claim is in the nature of consequent damages. My son Thos. had been attending a wireless school, owned by a Mr. P. H. Turner at 11 Lower O'Connell St. He had attended from the 1st of the previous February to the outbreak of the rebellion. I had paid £10 in fees, and had to maintain him in Dublin up to 1st May - 13 weeks. As a result of the destruction of the school, he has had to abandon the idea of becoming a wireless operator as he was only about half way through his course of instruction, and I cannot afford to send him to another school. Besides he had to give up employment in Lipton's L^{td}, when he went to this school, and has not yet got back to his employment, there being no vacancy. Here are given in detail the sums paid, which are a dead loss. I have not set down anything for the time he has remained unemployed since the destruction of the school.</p>
