I am very much surprised at the amount & think there must be a mistake. The value of the three watches taken alone came to very near this amount even after making the generous deduction that I did in the statement of claim. The loss of the gold watch was reported to the officer in charge at the time & I think this should be taken into consideration. I do not see how any deduction could possibly be made in the £2-10-3 claimed for cigarettes. The other articles removed were all new the "gentlemen" who removed them evidently being very particular.

I did not include for damaged articles, & I think it only proper I should get a fair allowance .

Dear Sir, I respectfully beg to draw your attention
to the fact, that my husband (Thomas Gillies)
& my brother James P. Renny, were arrested by
the military authorities on May 2nd & brought
to Portobello. Then to Richmond Barracks & deported
to Wakefield Detention Barracks on May 5th.
Suspicion is the charge. The military searched
the house & there were a few old bullets which my
brother gave them, nevertheless they arrested him
and my husband. I was twenty four days
without knowing if they had shared the same
fate as poor Mr Sheehy Skeffington.
Neither my husband or brother had hand act.

or part in the rebellion, nor were they volunteers
at all at any time, or members of the movement
in any way. They got forms to fill up, & they
did so, and my neighbours at no 30, whose son
is a Lieut. in Dublin Fusiliers, gave the police-
man who called, full information as to their being
at home here during the rising. Still I see no
sign of their release, and am writing to ask you
if you would interest yourself in their behalf
& as I have been able to do nothing on my own
acct. and you have done such a lot for others
I feel confident you will help them also. My
husband is an Electrical Engineer, (a son of the
late Mr Gillies of "Freeman's Journal" & he is very
much upset in his contracts, and a good course are
left unprovided for on that acct. My brother has
house property, shops & tenements, & the tenants
will not pay till he returns, which is very
doubtful among that class of people. My
brother too is delicate, & the authorities at Wakefield
have made them change their heavy flannels &
I fear for their health very much. I am enclosing
my husband's letter to me. The search party took
two or three watches, and all the Silk, Linen,
Handkerchiefs in the house. & with all this I had
to remain here five hours with those brutes for five
and no body to give me the slightest comfort
