He stated he had nothing whatsoever to do with the rebellion. All the articles have been in use for some considerable time & I consider the sum of £6 ample compensation.

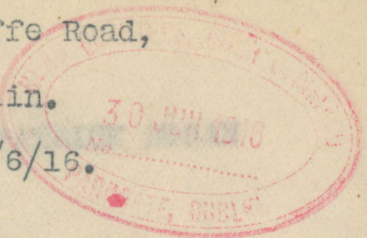

I was arrested on May 2nd. and released on June 5th.

No charge was preferred against me.

I intend to apply for compensation for this unjust and unwarranted arrest and detention.

I append copy of a receipt for money and valuables taken by a Military Officer, immediately after my arrest.

Subsequently, soldiers were put into my rooms and the articles of which I append a list were removed. These articles, I am informed, were taken whilst the soldiers were in complete control of the house, answering the door etc.

The list is necessarily incomplete as I never took stock of my belongings to the extent of being able to say precisely at any time what clothing etc., I had.

In books I estimate that at least one pounds worth is missing. Amongst the papers taken are manuscripts invaluable to me.

I was arrested by soldiers of the South Staffordshire Regiment.

I am sending copies of this letter to the Home Secretary, Mr John Dillon M.P., Mr Alfred Byrne M.P., Mr Laurence Ginnell M.P., and the Provost Marshal.
