of stained glass which can hardly be replaced. The scullery sink was choked with tea leaves & refuse thrown in by the soldiers, which took a plumber two days to clear & mend. Before leaving there was no attempt made to clean up, by the soldiers, & it took a charwoman a week at 3/- per day to scour & wash down. The plaster was knocked from the ceiling of the scullery & the mens feet wet & mudd

for days. ground the plaster into the boards, you can therefore understand how hard it was to get the place clean.
