Dear Sir,

I received the undernoted Policy from Mrs Conry to-day to be sent to you for notation. Mrs Conry states that your Assessor Mr Ingoldsbey asked her to produce this Policy which she only got back from her late Solicitor Mr Dawson on 26th inst. You will observe that the Policy was originally on the Claimant's goods in the house No.24 Eccles Street, and that it was endorsed to cover her goods at Wellington Lodge, Booterstown when she removed there in 1905. Dear Sir,

I have been handed by Mrs Conry a correspondence which took place between her and Col. Taylor the Assistant Director of Supplies and Transport, Head-quarters, Irish Command in June last. Mrs Conry informs me that provisions to the value of £5:5:0 which were in her house at the above address were consumed by the military who occupied same. In accordance with a notice which appeared in the Daily Newspapers, Mrs Conry sent in her claim and after some correspondence Col. Taylor wrote her on the 16th June 1916 pointing out that unless she could identify the Unit that was in her house, it was impossible for the Military to trace them, regretting the loss which she had suffered, denying liability and referring her to your Committee for redress in the following terms:- "All such charges are passed to the Under Secretary to be dealt with, as it is understood that some form of Board or Court will be assembled to deal with all losses in Dublin". The reference to this letter is H.Q. 359/207. Messrs H.C. Neilson & Son & Dawson, acting as my Agents, put forward Mrs Conry's Claim to compensation before your Committee, but seemingly through an inadvertence this item for provisions consumed by the Military was omitted.
