Sir.

Mr O'Connell. National teacher of Carrowlane School reported this matter to the local police early in May after the rebellion had been stopped. The police then saw 9 panes of glass. (one at the front of the school and 8 at the back) broken. The panes measure 14 x 10 inches each.

The police do not know who did the damage. Mr O'Connell did not see the soldiers do it. He referred me to a Miss Greene who, he said, saw them do it. I interviewed her. She did not see them either breaking the windows or entering the school but she saw the military near the school.

On the date the damage was done (29 April 16) a detachment of military marched from Loughrea to Dunsandle, passing by the schoolhouse which was at this time locked up. The school door was forced open, and 9 panes of glass broken as stated; but I can get no evidence to show by whom. The military may have gone into the school to search it.

I am told it will cost  
about sixteen shillings  
to get them in - not a  
big sum indeed - and



I will feel obliged if  
you kindly let me know  
shall I be recouped  
to that amount if  
I get them in myself.  
I thought the glass might  
have been broken from  
the outside, but a  
man living quite close  
has told me that he  
saw them come in and  
heard them fire from  
the inside. I understand  
the government compensate
