The Film Company of Ireland, at the time of the insurrection, was situated at 16, henry Street, and had in its possession many manuscripts of photo scenarios. A great number of these had been ready, accepted, and paid for. Your scenario, which you inform us was addressed to our Office, and which we have no record of, might easily have been among those that had not yet been read and passed upon.

We have no reason to doubt that this is so, as you inform us that you addressed the scenario to our company some time previous to the disaster. The fact that the scenario is not remembered could be explained by reason of a change in Producers. Mr. Haldane, who was our Producer, is no longer with the Company, and the Company has no knowledge of his whereabouts.
