I got the enclosed
from Dublin Jettie
which I returned & said
it could never never
be that I would only
get £4.0.0 for my
very valuable gold
watch that I would not

even let into the hands
of a small Jeweller
to put on a glass
because I was warned
I am sure no person
could do such an
injustice, as only five
me £4.0.0. at first
my claim was for £20.0.0
but later on, I was told by
a gentleman, who knew
it & was a thorough
judge of its value
that it was worth £25.0.0

I was told the same
by several people
who were judges. As
my watch was not
one of the low grade
of gold watches. As it
wasn't a cheap light-
thin cased small
watch as I so often
see, anything the same
person bought was
the very best quality
I got a little article
from the same dear one

& when I got it I didn't
think much of it now I
find it valued seven guineas
& I can get plenty to
prove what my watch
was. although I didn't know
it was so expensive when
I first put in the claim
but I told a Mr Swift -
who wrote about it later
that I found it was value
for at least £25-0-0 & to try
to get that amt for me money
couldn't buy it from me
& it is ~~bad~~ ^{not} very bad to loose
it & to get its full value would be
terrible & I am not fit for
such annoyance. So send
me cheque for full amt & oblige
