TO-MORROW'S PARLIAMENT

GOVERNMENT AND THE SECRET SESSION.

The New Order in Council.

A SEVERE CRITICISM.

Having for the moment composed their differences on the recruiting question, Ministers spent Saturday afternoon in legislation against their own indiscretions (says the "Times"). A drastic Order in Council, hurriedly passed at Windsor Castle, prohibits not only the publication of any report of the proceedings at the secret sessions of the two Houses to be held to-morrow, or of any other such sessions, but also the publication of any reference to the proceedings of any meeting of the Cabinet and to certain kinds of confidential information. If it be granted that the expedient of a secret session is desirable — and, as we said on Friday, it is an innovation on all modern practice which can only be justified by results — the first provision is reasonable enough. It is the logical consequence of the adoption of secrecy, and the only condition on which a semblance of secrecy can be preserved. Whether it is likely to prove more than a semblance may be doubted. The second provision is by far the more important. It seems a curiously cumbrous method of attempting to prevent the kind of leakage from the Cabinet which went on throughout last week. No surprise can be felt that some efforts in that direction should be made, for the disclosure of confidential information had attained the proportions of a scandal. But do the Government realise the dangers to which their own disunion is driving them? This Order in Council is a confession of weakness and another step on the downward path. Unable to preserve discipline amongst themselves, they have hastily issued a decree which is calculated if not intended to prevent the nation from knowing more about its own most vital affairs than Ministers think it convenient to tell. Nearly all the troubles of Mr. Asquith's past and present administration have sprung from want of candour. The remedy in which he now seeks refuge is to take arbitrary powers to clothe everything in deeper mystery than ever. We have seen enough of Government methods in the exercise of such powers to know that they have been constantly directed against those who have been inconveniently urging a more effective prosecution of the war, while indulgence has been extended to the faithful partisans who strive by all sorts of intrigue to hold the nation back. There is no precedent in our constitutional history of modern days for any powers to silence opinion which even approach those the Government have taken to themselves by the second paragraph of this Order. They are dangerous powers in their present extension to repose in any man, and Parliament and the public will do well to scrutinise them with jealousy.
