I am afraid I cannot remember the name of the glasses. I bought them at the Army & Navy Stores London, they were prismatic ones with No. 8 Lens & cost £10.2.6. , my name was both on the cover of the case and on the glasses.

P.S. I gave a description to the Detective Department of the Police Station at College Green about a fortnight after the Rising. I bought the glasses in the Stores between the 20th August 1915 & September 8th 1915.

Is there any chance of getting compensation from the Government.
