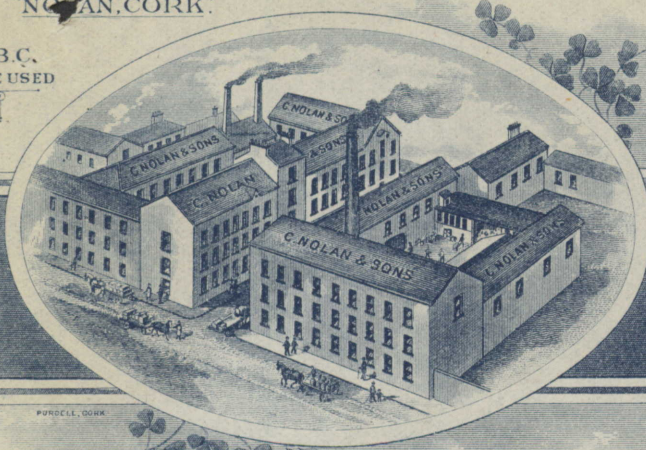

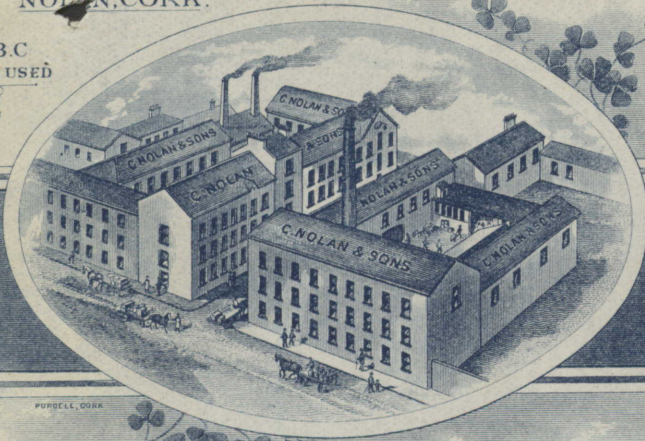

Dear Sirs,

With reference to your claim of £10.16.0 for butter lost in transit to Messrs. McLoughlan Bros., Belfast on the 22nd April, I beg to reply that this butter was held up in Dublin during the Rebellion and because of same, and during that period the wagon in which your consignment was carried was looted at our North Wall Station and the shortage complained of is due to that cause. In these circumstances the Company cannot admit any liability as the loss is beyond our control. To assist you however, I placed your demand before the Property Losses (Ireland) Committee 1916, the body dealing with such matters, and they now reply that the claim should be made by the owner of such looted property. Will you please therefore, address your claim to the Secretary of that Committee, J.J. Healy Esq., 51, St. Stephens Green, Dublin. This should be done immediately as they are closing their books forthwith.
