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

re/ CLAIM by Mr. J. J. McQUILLAN, 35 & 36 Capel Street.

Dear Sir,

In reply to yours of the 17th. inst. in which you ask a number of questions, I beg to reply as follows:-

The men who forced open and entered the premises of my client, Mr. J. J. McQuillan, did so under the direction of Major J. D. Johnston, Prince of Wales Leinster Regiment, and it is assumed that the men under his command were of his own regiment.

A copy of the list of missing articles was furnished to General Sir John Maxwell on the 5th. day of June 1916.

I would point out to you that the premises were broken open by command of Major Johnston in presence of Mr. Simon Branstein, a member of the General Reserve of His Majesty's Forces, who is the tenant residing over Mr. McQuillan's premises - No. 35. After the goods had been taken, Major Johnston, and also a Major R.H. Metge, who wrote his name on the back of Major Johnston's card, and described himself as "Commanding the 5th. Leinsters in seige of Dublin" had a conversation with the tenant, Mr. Simon Branstein, and discussed quite freely the forcible entry of the shop, and when leaving Major Johnston gave him the card herein referred to, which card my client now holds. As well as this man, Mr. McQuillan has a number of witnesses to prove as to the entry of the military, and the extraction of the goods from his premises.

I enclose you a copy of the list of missing articles as furnished to General Sir John Maxwell, but indeed, I may state, that

my client has, since the furnishing of this list, found many empty boxes amongst his stock, which he is quite sure contained goods prior to the entry by the Military.

In addition to the articles being missing, Mr. McQuillan's stock was strewn about the shop, and the entire premises left in a state of confusion, yet, he does not complain of the damage and inconvenience which he has suffered, but merely asks to be compensated he for the articles which he missed when/returned to his premises after the disturbance, and which, I think, there is no doubt were taken by the military.

I think, in the circumstances, his request is very modest, and I must ask you to have the matter looked into at your early convenience, and see that my client is paid.

As stated in my previous letter, I would be sorry to be compelled to take action against the Military Authorities, but I must carry out my instructions.
