Remarks She was advanced the sum of 10/- on it, and on calling some time later to pay back the money, was informed that it could not be found and had been probably been taken by the Military, who searched the place. Pawnbroker considers that it is not very valuable, and under these circumstances I consider £1.10.0. ample for the case.

Dear Sir

I beg to ask you  
for your kind advice in  
reference to a ring, which  
I pawned at the Marlborough  
Street pawnbrokers office  
on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of December  
1915. for the sum of  
10/- when doing so  
the manager remarked  
to me that all  
I required to borrow on  
same I said that was  
all as it would be  
easier to get back  
I called at this office

4 on the 23<sup>rd</sup> June last  
1916 and tendered the sum  
of 1/10 for renewal of  
same which the manager  
marked my old ticket at  
1/9 and when he went  
to the drawer he could  
not find the ring he  
asked me to call in on  
the following day and  
on doing so I was informed  
that this ring had  
been stolen by the  
soldiers during the  
rebellion. he again asked  
me to call in again in  
2 weeks time saying he  
was putting a claim in  
for a lot of stolen  
property

on calling again at the end  
of this time he again asks  
me to call again after  
two or three weeks time  
and every time I called  
after he would tell me  
to call again after one  
or ~~to~~ two weeks time  
untill at last I called  
on Thursday last 14<sup>th</sup>  
he told me then that he  
had got no satisfaction  
from the Government nor  
was he going to get  
any and in any case if  
he did so. there would  
be no redress for me  
this ring was a gift  
to me by a very dear  
friend. the late  
Mr. Eugen Oberhoffer

4/whome was killed in  
France on January 1915  
and was late Head waiter  
of St Erminns Hotel  
London it was 18 carat  
gold about 6 pennyweight  
and was set with two  
Safires 2 pearls and one  
Ruby in center it was  
bought whole sale from  
a friend of his for  
the sum of £ 3-15-0  
I will thank you very much  
if you will be so kind as  
to give me some advice  
of what I ought to do  
to recover same.
