Remarks. There was a suggestion that the Goods claimed for in this case were stolen & disposed of previous to the interests in the buildings. Rebellion & suspicion was directed against a youth named *W.P. Keeling*, this contention being however solely supported by the claimants Dublin Agent (Mr. John Moran, 14 Fleet St). In view of this I made a thorough & minute investigation & interviewed in addition to the aforesaid John Moran; the Midland Railway Co. of England (see correspondence attached to claim papers); Gillen & Co (the Youth's employers at time of fire); Hutton & Co (his present employers) & also the youth Keeling who is a straightforward boy & altogether above suspicion. I am satisfied the claim is a perfectly genuine one. The amount claimed however is the Wholesale price &

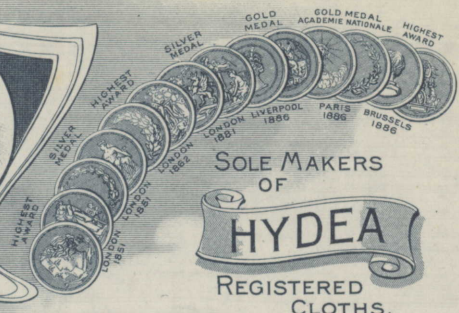
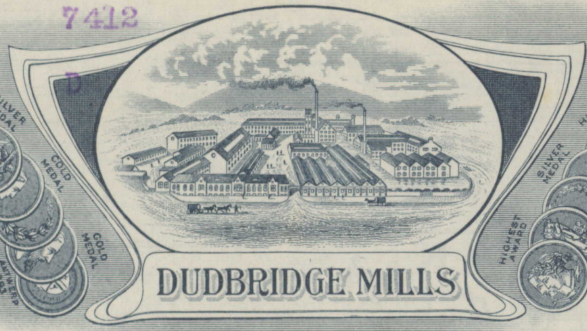
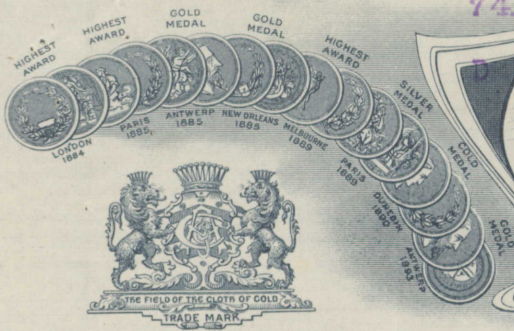

Referring to the conversation that our Mr. Wilson had with you a few days ago regarding the truss of cloth from Messrs. Apperley Curtis & Co., Stroud,.

We have consulted Messrs. Sheridan & Kenny, our solicitors, who inform us that we have a clear discharge for the goods on April 20th. and that it is for you or Messrs. Apperley, Curtis & Co. to put in a claim to the Secretary of the Property Losses, Ireland, Committee.

It appears from what the youth says who signed for the goods that when he entered the service of Mr. Gillen nearly ~~three~~ ^{four} years ago, it came to his knowledge that it was the practice to sign for goods on your behalf if you were absent and that he has continued to do so all through, also ^{that} from time to time you enquired of him in Mr. Gillen's office if there were goods for you. He also states that he had not seen you during the week in question, after the first portion and that about that time you told him that you were expecting some goods.

As you told our Mr. Wilson a few days ago that you would not put in a claim I consulted Messrs. Sheridan & Kenny who, owing to the ^{long} time that had elapsed since the loss occurred, decided to protect the
