Dear Sir,

Referring to the claim lodged with the Committee by you on behalf of the Secretary of State for War for supplies lost en route to Oldcastle, I am directed by the Property Losses Committee to say that they have received instructions from the Irish Government to exclude from consideration, as a general rule, all claims in respect of Government property destroyed or damaged during the disturbances in April-May 1916. The Committee, therefore, do not propose to deal with the claim put forward in this case.

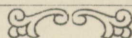

Dear Sir,

Further to my letter of yesterday on the subject of goods removed by the Military without acknowledgment from the Company's premises during the recent Rebellion. I beg to submit a further case for your consideration.

A claim of £2-3-6 is made by Mr. Wm. Young, 16 Allingham St. South Summer Street, Dublin for blankets, sheets, etc. which formed part of a consignment entered to him per Southall (G.W.R.) Inv. Y2. 5/4/16 to Dublin. The consignment arrived at our North Wall Station in due course, and was observed to be in apparent good condition on Saturday 22nd. April. The Military subsequently took over control of our Store there, and when our Staff returned after the Rebellion it was found that claimant's goods had been tampered with. When consignee called for the consignment on 9th. May he complained of the shortage claimed for. As the circumstances point to the goods having been taken by the Military without acknowledgment I shall be glad if you will give the matter your consideration, and favour me with your reply.

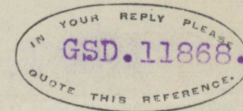

We are in a position to prove that the sacks were at North Wall on the 22/4/16, but they were not to be found when normal working was resumed, and as the Military were in possession of the Station it is obvious that use of the sacks must have been made by them.
