My Sleeping Apartment was injured by a Rifle Bullet as follows. Bullet came through 2 Panes of Glass (both sashes being open at the time) & one bar of the Venetian Blind. It carried a piece of Plaster out of the centre of the Ceiling = size of one's hand = full depth of the plaster so that the laths are now seen. Next it lodged in extreme corner diagonally of the Wainscot, having in its way splintered 2 other panes of the Wainscot & part of the Cornice, and broke a Glass Candle Shade - value 1/- which stood on my bedside Table. This occurred on Friday 28 th April when there were no longer any rebels in the Green, I saw those left for dead (5 in front of this house, within the gates & railings) & there had been NO enemy firing since the previous Tuesday at midnight when the King's troops arrived at the Hotel. I am a Scotchwoman & a loyal Subject of King George! but I am distressed to see my old Georgian wardrobe injured!
