Referring to remark re "Punch" in my last letter lest there might be any misunderstanding no contributions have been sent by me since they did not publish extract from "Field" which stated the Heuse of Commons had been disinfected by the same firm which had

disinfected the Menkey House at the Zoo.

Further information of an interesting nature has come to my knewledge regarding an award by the Committee, as it tends to confirm my suggestion and also opens up the question of dealing with heavy masses your attention is again invited to securing the services of the collector of milestones - if he is not already a Minister of semething.

Having regard to the Haberdashery awards it will at once arouse interest to discover on what basis this award has been made, and who the expert was (if any) by whose advice the matter was

concluded.

Having gone carefully over the correspondence the silence of the Committee is inexplicable, there is not the slightest trace or indication of anything calculated to give the least offence to gentlemen - with whom it is always so pleasant to deal - on the centrary not only has my assistance been offered in bringing forward the great discovery, but it has been done with sympathy!

One of the first questions to be solved is the handling of pictures by artists alone, owing to the great weight some will attain when completed, this can best be accomplished by a travelling crane mounted on rails fixed near ceiling or roof of studio.

There is nothing novel in this, but by suitable devices attached to the crane the picture can be inclined and held securely at any

desired angle, there is no doubt that in the clips or holders which support the picture or frame wing to the unusual form of the joints there is subject matter for a valid patent.

Extract from proposs-d specification:-

"Asimple medification allows that swings can be erected or a means by which household washing can be suspended."

Gentlemen of the Committee's experience in art matters will appreciate the capabilities of the pictures being inclined as stated. The object of specifying the very obvious household uses to which the crane can be adapted is to endeavour to interest the Germans who knowing the Committee's great reputation and the wonderful and simple way they solved the question of valuing works of art, may be induced to start manufacturing the device with a view to securing a commercial advantage after the war to the disadvantage of their own munition supply of their own munition supply.

"We were living too much under a regime in which disagreeable truths had been quite unnecessarily concealed, and much harm, in his view had been done thereby."

Your attention is invited to the above as you are aware no answer has been given to my repeated enquiry as to what was agreed to with Mr O'Brien, it is to avoid the possibility of doing any harm that I must again press for the truth which seemingly has "been guite unnecessarily concealed."

(I may say I do not think the words quoted had any reference

to this correspondence.)

It is utterly impossible that a great and far reaching movement such as is bound to arise - if my supposition is correct that the awards have been governed by the weight of the paint used - be successfully accomplished without full disclosives, this of course having an interest myself in connection with the proposal to use the "Metric" system I will naturally look after.

Already the question of sculpture has been considered and I

incline to the view that owing to the great weight of the objects the services of the gentleman who collected milestones might be enlisted for this branch. The nevelty of his taste and the skill and judgement he displayed in classifying these seemingly inartistic productions may be considered a recommendation, please let me know shall I get in touch with him?

-Referring new to the appointment of a Minister of Paint, something should soon be done or there will not be any one left fit to fill such a responsible office, here I may be able to give some assistance also, knowing one of the principal colour makers who was I think a supporter of the late Government - the Government to which the Member for North Kilkenny attributed such interesting characteristics - as I am in communication with him.

Owing to the disadvantage of not having had an English University education (already mentioned) I usually submit important letters to a friend for correction, he remarked that he considered this correspondence fit for "Punch," this has astenished me very much as I have other views for its publication. is an instance of the unfortunate way Trishmen sometimes look at business matters, perhaps the following will explain what I mean.

On the steamer going to New York a gentleman asked me to subscribe towards a fund for the band, giving him a trifle I asked "Who was collection for the men who blew the fog-horn at night?"

He replied he had not heard but would enquire, a passenger standing

standing by remarked it would take him three weeks to understand my

meaning as he was an Englishman. I thought this funny.

In the afternoon the gentleman sought me out and said he was informed there were six quarter-masters on the ship, one was a widower, one unmarried, four had families, one man as many a seven children, that their wages were so much weekly and it was not considered necessary to make any collection for them.

When this was told to the passenger he laughed in a most unseemly manner and when I asked him what had amused him he only told

ms to get out of his sight that I was "worse than the other!"

This remarkable observation has puzzled me and persons to whom I have teld the above say "can't you see it?" I really cannot see anything but an instance of that beautiful thirst for knowledge and power of grasping details which make me satisfied once the Nation take it up it is bound to be successful, every effort must be made to get this matter forward at once, so as to live up to the poet's ideal,

"Napelson the first made a wise observation,
That the English were only a shopkeeping Nation."
Bearing in mind also that:"Experts are authorities, and unless they speak authoritatively and immediately, their expert knowledge is of little or no use."

It has been pointed out to me how agreeable it will be to persons who suddenly acquire wealth to find a new means for advertising same by speaking of the great weight of their new pertraits, the number of men required to raise them to their resting places and the necessity of strengthing the old walls of the house, these persons usually move into old houses.

It is quite understandable how the Committee may regard the prespect of world-wide fame being suddenly thrust on them, this,

however, is one of the penalties of greatness.

Further no time can be lost lest the Germans may hear of the idea, it has been stated in the Press:-

What Germany said about English gentlemen was published also it reads:-

Cheque £25. 10. 6, nor acknowledgement of letters of 7th, 10th and 21st instants not yet received, this is remarkable, possibly the Committee do not grasp the far reaching consequences which may attend the award to the gentleman using large quantities of paint. It appears to be the only means yet arrived at by which the value of pictures can be standardised and such works of art sold by weight! Secondly (and this is of grave importance) it may indirectly be the means of introducing the "Metric" system of weights and measures.

It is needless to add gentlemen of the Committee's great \*\*\*RXX\*\* experience must be fully aware that it is now optional to use this system in some cases, consequently as a new method of selling pictures may follow the Committee's action it will be a suitable time to introduce the much desired system!

The following illustration which might be from a sale catalogue

shows how easily the proposed arrangement can be understood:-

Portrait of a gentleman (very rere type) 350 m/m x 300 m/m, weight(not including frame) 18, kilograms, 1, hectogram, 2, dekagrams, 7, grammes, 5, decigrams, 4, centigrams and 9, milligrams.

What honours, titles and other trifles may ultimately and deservedly come to the Committee in consequence of their original finding, time alone will tell, I however, cannot see my way to allow my claim to recognition for suggesting the "Metric" system to be overlooked, although seeing gentlemen are concerned it is "unthinkable" - with the Haberdashery awards in evidence - that they would not have my intetests properly brought forward, but to remove all doubt from their minds and at the same time save them trouble I will look after myself, consequently it is preferred to make the matter public at once to which end the co- ordination of the Committee is invited, any suggestions they may make will receive careful attention if accompanied by the required cheque for the sum named at head of this sheet.

No reply to my letters dated 7th, 10th and 17th instants nor cheque £25. 10. 6, balance for claim No. 1095 yet received.

Referring to the award of a larger proportional amount to an artist than was given in my case, the Committee are of course awars of a characteristic of this gentleman's work and being experts are consequently alive to the results that will most probably follow, seeing the quantity of paint and manner he applies same.

Gentlemen of their experience are no doubt aware of the opinion expresses by an autist recording the work of another painter, that

expresses by an artist regarding the work of another painter, that it would be excellent for an Institution for the Blind, as the inmates could rub their hands over his pictures and say, "This is a rock,

this is the sea."

With this in evidence the Committee will no doubt see it is desirable to say what influence (if any) this characteristic had in enabling them to come to their decision in the case in question, clearly if quantity of material used is to be the basis upon which pictures in future will be assessed no time should be lost in making the fact public!

It has been mentioned more than once how pleasant it is to deal with gentlemen, to which must now be added congratulations to the Committee on being the first to recognise a new "school" of painting and lay down an original standard for the value of works of art!

The Committee having so far observed silence as to their action in coming to a decision will new see how advisable it will be to admit if the above is a correct conclusion, for it would be extremely painful to think they might loose the credit of the

most remarkable discovery of the age.

It is of course just a question if this is the best time to establish a "school" which undoubtedly will be the means of using up vast quantities of paint, so far we have not heard of a Minister of Paint, but with such distinguished experts discovering a "school" and having regard to the Haberdashery awards the outlook of art from the commercial standpoint will welcomed, a stray Hotel or Club may yet be available for effices.

The Committee may rest satisfied I will give every assistance in making the transactions public when they desire, awaiting reply

to this communication.

Referring to correspondence re claim for picture &c. destroyed, as pointed out the sum of £17. 17. 0. is quite inadequate to meet same, this was shown in my letter of 18th ultime on the basis of a "time and material" account, the value of the work from an artistic point not being advanced.

Since writing which letter I have ascertained Mr O'Brien President R. H. A. was consulted.

Having regard to the fact the claims for haberdashery and other like goods seem to have been paid in full it suggests the assessors while quite alive to the value of such materials are not equally familiar with works of art, unless of course haberdashery experts were called in to assist them, in which case an explanation of Mr O'Brien's opinion will be advisable as well as a readjustment of the award before the matter passes into other hands, as I happen to held the written apinion of one of the greatest modern experts regarding my work it will be more agreeable if this course is followed.


