In regard to this claim we called upon you personally, and you referred us to Miss Quann. We called on Miss Quann at the Avondale Hotel, Lower Gardiner Street, and was informed that she was not in, but that they were expecting her in shortly. We left our address and asked her to call and see us with reference to this claim, but for reasons only known to herself, she did not think it worth her while to see us, and we understand left for America without giving us any opportunity of making direct personal inquiries from herself.

In your correspondence with us you have threatened twice to have the matter discussed elsewhere. In the nature of things these threats appear to be out of place, and you must have failed to grasp the situation in which the owner's property alleged to be destroyed, stands with regard to any claim made upon the Government. We have no evidence as yet, beyond the statement of claim as to the value of the articles destroyed, and we are not in a position at present to make any suggestion as to what compensation Miss Quann is entitled to. McCormick, in the first instance for the purpose of making the usual investigation, but he referred us to the Claimant, who at that time was staying at the Avondale Hotel, Lower Gardiner Street. Upon our visiting the Avondale Hotel however, we were informed that the Claimant had gone out and would not return for an hour or so. We left word for her to call with us that same day, but she never did so, and we understand went off to U.S.A. the next day or so.

We subsequently took the matter up with Claimant's Solicitor, but as you will see from the correspondence herewith, which speaks for itself, he has refused to vouch the claim, and threatens to have the matter discussed elsewhere, presumably in Parliament, unless the Committee, comply with the Claimant's demands.

We return you all the papers herewith, in case you may desire to

refer to them, and shall be pleased to learn the Committee's views on the matter, and to carry out their further instructions.

Dear Sirs,

Referring to our conversation over the telephone this morning I beg to inform you that at the end of June 1916 Wiss Quann consulted me with reference to her claim which I prepared and had verified by her on the 3rd July 1916 and Miss Quann instructed me that the amounts claimed represented the cost price of the articles destroyed by the fire in the Waverley Hotel and that these for the greater part had been then recently purchased.

My Client informed me at the time that was leaving immediately for the United States and she is there now, her present address being 122 East Superior St. Chicago, Illinois, as appears by a letter dated 3rd January 1917 which I received from her the other day.

I am sending you a file containing bills paid by my
Client in the Waverley Hotel and all her letters to me and the
original list of articles lost made out by her also a letter
received by me from her brother Mr. Wm. P. Quann in October last.

From conversations I had with Miss Quann before her departure for the States I am quite satisfied that she is a most respectable and trustworthy lady and that so far from her having any connection with the Sinn Fein Rebellion she was intensely antagonistic to the Sinn Fein movement and bitterly complained of the lawlessness that she witnessed during Easter week.

I think if you communicate with Mr. Robert Ross, Kingscourt House, Clontary, the Proprietor of the Waverley Hotel, he
will satisfy you as to the respectability and bona fides of Miss
Quann and I also think that either he or Mrs Ross could in a
general way inform you as to the number of boxes and cases Miss
Quann had with her in the Hotel and which were destroyed in the
fire there.

It would be well if you again refer to the United States Consul for any information you may require as to Miss Quann and her bona fides and in this connection I have to refer you to Mr. Welklejohn's letter to me of the 25rd November last in which that Centleman testifies to the high reputation and character of Miss Quann and to his conviction that her claim was absolutely just and reasonable.

As all the invoices, bills and receipts were lost in the fire I do not see how either Miss Quann or I can furnish you with any documentary evidence in support of the claim.

Rindly return the enclosed file of documents when you have perused.

You will see that the Lady was also in communication with Mr. Kidney the Secretary of the Property Losses Association.

Upon the whole I am convinced that there is ample evidence as to the bona fides of the Lady and I think when you have made the further inquiries indicated above you yourselves will be wesses. Wm. Montgomery & Son 2
